Religion Grade 5 Curriculum Objectives

Awareness of God

Message Doctrinal

- Identifies God is with us everywhere, especially through His people and the Church
- Recognizes Jesus as the visible sign of God's love
- Is helped to recognize that Jesus is both God and man Incarnation
- Is aware of our beliefs as Catholics as stated in the Nicene Creed
- Describes faith as a way of believing, trusting, and living in our God
- Explains that through Christ's resurrection we are welcomed into a new life
- Understands that abortion is the killing of an innocent life
- Is aware that only God has the power to create life and to end it
- Learns to accept people who are different from him/herself
- Learns about sacramentals and recognizes the Church's use of them
- Learns and appreciates the Church's Saints and Communion of Saints
- Understands and appreciates the Church's feasts and seasons
- Expands their understanding of Churches as a place for worship and prayer
- Names the seven sacraments and explains the ritual and symbols used in each
- Categorizes the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist
- Categorizes the Sacraments of Healing: Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick
- Categorizes the Sacraments of Commitment: Matrimony, Holy Orders

Message Historical

- Identifies different religious traditions Catholic, Jewish, Protestant
- Sees forgiveness as a basic element of reconciliation
- Understands the call to service as a result from their baptismal commitment
- Is aware of vocations in the religious, married, and single life

Awareness of Values

Morality Personal

- Appreciates and values God's gift of time
- Understands that he/she is called to be compassionate like Jesus
- Learns that the Ten Commandments and Beatitudes are the basis of our moral code
- Reviews actions that harm others and then asks "What would Jesus do?"
- Understands the importance of forming a good conscience
- Explores the nature and responsibility of friendship
- Identifies his/her bonding with the People of God today through the sacraments of initiation
- Emphasizes Mary and the saints as examples of commitment and service to community
- Respects and loves persons of other faiths
- Recalls that God came into our world to save us
- Explores ways that God has asked us to care for His world
- Uses his/her talents to the best of their abilities

Morality Social

- Engages in problem solving to promote responsible actions to care for God's creation
- Relates that God cares deeply how we treat others
- Verifies that life is precious at all its stages
- Identifies prejudices and the harm they can cause
- Cites practical ways to be a peacemaker
- Lists and discusses causes of war and violence
- Identifies how various races and ethnic values contribute to culture life
- Is aware of Christian organizations addressing world problems: Food for the Poor, Mary knoll Missions, St. Jude's Children's Hospital, Make a Wish, Sister Parishes, etc.

Morality Service/Witness

- Recalls that the Beatitudes and Corporal & Spiritual Works of Mercy as guidelines for living justly
- Regards service as a sign of membership in the Church
- Becomes aware of the needs of people in his/her parish and community
- Recognizes role models of service in his/her local community
- Responds to the challenge of world hunger and poverty
- Takes part in food and clothing drives sponsored by local organizations

Awareness of Others

Community Development

- Recognizes community as a call to experience the love of God with other Catholic believers
- Explores the nature and responsibility of friendship
- Describes Catholics as a sacramental people
- Identifies God's bonding with His people today through the sacraments of initiation
- Emphasizes Mary and the saints as examples of commitment and service to community
- Distinguishes between his/her wants and needs
- Acknowledges every human person has rights and responsibilities
- Is made aware of parish outreach services

Awareness of Spiritual Development

Worship Scriptural

- Understands that the bible was written by many people
- Knows that the Bible is divided into Old and New Testament
- Understands that god reveals himself through Scripture and Tradition
- Locates and discusses specific parables Jesus used to teach the people lessons
- Identifies the Psalms as prayers of Jesus and His people
- Summarizes the Scriptural stories relating to the sacraments
- Recognizes the use of Scripture in sacramental celebrations
- Through Scripture identifies and appreciates the many images of God and Jesus
- Understands Jesus' relationship with God, His Father
- Through scripture learns about sacred places to our faith
- Sees Jesus as teacher, prophet, and Son of God

Worship Prayer

- Explores personal places for experiencing God through prayer
- Explores the meaning of prayer on broader level (God & me) (God, others, and me)
- Identifies the elements of the Lord's Prayer
- Explores and creates his/her own modern day version of Lord's Prayer
- Identifies and examines the elements of The Creed
- Constructs spontaneous and mediation prayers
- Receives and learns about different types of blessings
- Prays the Eucharistic Liturgy (Mass)
- Knows liturgical responses
- · Recites the Rosary with an awareness of the meaning of Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful, and Glorious Mysteries
- Knows how to pray the Stations of the Cross
- Experiences devotions as prayer: rosary, way of the cross, prayer to saints, novenas
 - Recites from memory formal prayers:
 - > Acts of Faith, Hope, and Love
 - Act of Contrition
 - > Prayer to St. Francis
 - Come Holy Spirit
 - Grace before Meals
 - Nicene Creed
 - Lord's Prayer

Worship Sacraments

- Identifies a sacrament as an outward sign, instituted by Christ, to give grace
- Identifies the seven sacraments as life-giving rituals and symbols in which we grow closer to God
- Recognizes that the grace of God is a special gift we receive when we receive the sacraments
- Tells how Baptism calls us to new life, cleanses us from sin and welcomes us into the Christian community
- Recognizes that Confirmation strengthens us and seals the bond we received at Baptism
- Realizes that Reconciliation is a journey of conversion, which brings forgiveness which brings us closer to God and the Church
- Identifies the presence and the sacrifice of Christ in the community meal of the Eucharist
- Celebrates and receives Eucharist at the body an blood of Jesus
- Witnesses Christ's healing presence in our lives through the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick
- Recognizes the call to serve God's people through the ministry of Holy Orders
- Discusses the sacrament of Matrimony, as a life long covenant between man and woman

Worship Liturgical

- Participates in communal prayers and signs of forgiveness that are part of the Eucharistic Liturgy (Mass) : Lord have Mercy; Our Father; Sign of the Cross
- Worships through Scripture, planned liturgies and prayer services
- Describes sacramental celebrations as community worship
- Explains basic elements of Liturgical year: Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, Ordinary Time, Holy days, Major Marian feasts
- Names and explains the significance of different liturgical colors for each season
- Review the Mass and its major parts
- Explains the Easter Triduum as the height of the Liturgical year
- Is made aware of the Holy Days of Obligation
- Celebrates the lives of saints as good Christian models for his/her life

Projects:

Rewrite and use illustrations creating a modern day version of The Lord's Prayer
